Theft From Auto. Eliminate the Opportunity

Thieves look for the right opportunity.

Generally, thieves look for easy, risk free opportunities. Drivers become complacent about vehicle security and tend to leave their cars unlocked, windows down, and valuables in plain sight and easily accessible. As a result, drivers unwittingly create an easy opportunity for thieves to commit a crime.

Target Selection, Why Your Vehicle?

Suburban residential neighborhoods and parking lots offer criminals a large number of potential opportunities for theft. The area can be quickly canvassed by thieves. Generally thieves already possess the desire to commit a crime. By exploiting unlocked cars or cars with windows left down or visually identifying a desirable object in plain view, a thief needs very little ability to commit the crime.

Don't Provide the Opportunity!

Items are stolen from a vehicle every 8 minutes in the State of Maryland. 28% of all thefts reported are thefts from vehicles.

Prevention Tips, Removing the Opportunity.

 Roll up your windows before parking. Keep the vehicle locked when unattended.

- Keep packages, loose change, garage door openers and valuables out of sight or in the trunk.
- Do not hide a second set of keys in/on your car.
- Look for parking spaces in well lighted areas.
- Avoid parking near dumpsters, large vans, or trucks that would obstruct the public view of your vehicle .
- Record serial numbers for cell phones, GPS units, portable music players and other items frequently used in your vehicle.
- The only thing that the thief lacks is an **opportunity.**

Medication Disposal Program

Did you know you can bring your outdated or unwanted medication to the Sheriff's Office for disposal?

- Bring your medication to the drop box at one of our district stations.
- Remove any personal information, including the Rx number from the medication's container.
- Place your medication in the protective plastic bag provided.

• Discard it in the drop box.

We accept prescription and nonprescription medication, pet medication, and vitamins. Liquids or syringes will not be accepted.

Improper discarding of medication is an environmental hazard. The medication inevitably makes its way into our water system, and the contamination cannot be completely eliminated through the water treatment process. Our services safely dispose of your medication, and you can participate anonymously.

Going on Vacation?



- Lock all your windows and doors. Don't forget about doors leading to the garage or second story windows.
- Have mail and newspaper delivery stopped.
 A sign that nobody is home is a stack of mail and newspapers. You can temporarily stop delivery by contacting your newspaper carrier and the United States Post Office.
- Make sure any yard tools are put away. A ladder, rakes, and even patio furniture can all be used as tools to gain entry to your home.
- Unplug tvs, lamps, computers and other items that may be destroyed in an electric storm or power surge.
- Stay off social media. Don't tip criminals off

by sharing too much information on your social networks. Don't announce, "heading to the beach" or "vacation time".

Refrain from posting photos, status updates, or "checking in" while on vacation. Keep cash and credit cards in separate places. Never carry your credit cards and cash at the same time. You'll want to keep some cash in your wallet, and then stash the rest in a pocket or money pouch. Lock some cash in your glove compartment in your vehicle.

- Remember to pack medications your family members need and a first aid kit.
- Never stop at an outdoor ATM machine after dark.
- Always park in a welllighted area and notice where your vehicle is parked.
- Secure valuables left in

the vehicle in the center console, glove box, or trunk.

- Always put your windows up and lock your doors. Your vehicles locks are only good if you use them.
- When you arrive at your hotel, check for emergency exits.
- Make sure the locks on the doors of your room all work.
- Never tell someone you just met where you are staying and your room number or which floor you are on.
- Carry emergency numbers, neighbors, doctors etc.
- Let family members and trusted neighbors know where you are, how long you will be and how to reach you.
- When packing to return home remember to look under the bed, behind the doors, in the laundry and out on the patio for things you don't want to leave behind.
