- \$500.00 Fine
- Jail Time- 60 Days

• \$500.00 Fine

- \$500 Fine
- Jail Time—60 Days

• \$290.00 Fine

Driving an uninsured motor vehicle

• Up to \$500.00 Fine

Charles County Crime Solvers

Crime Solvers helps Charles County residents keep their community safe by providing a way to anonymously report information about crimes. Crime Solvers is community based and pays cash rewards for tips that lead to arrests and help solve crimes.

Crime Solvers is funded through private donations and fundraisers. No government funding is provided. Crime Solvers holds two annual fundraisers—a trap shoot and golf tournament. Additionally, in 2013, the Board of Directors launched a general membership campaign to attract outside members. There are four membership classes: business, individual, civic organization and patron. Membership dues and benefits vary depending on class.

How Crime Solvers Works:

Information about a crime may be reported in any of the following ways:

Call 1-866-411-TIPS (8477).

Send a text message to Crimes (recipient) and start your message with the word Charles.

Send a tip through a secure website,

www.tipsubmit.com

The call center is open 24 hours a day, seven days a

week, and it is staffed by people who personally answer your call. You will not be asked for any personal information. There is no caller ID and your name cannot be traced. Callers receive a confidential. unique identification number to use when checking the status of a case. If your tip leads to an arrest, you may be eligible for a cash reward. If you are eligible for a reward, you will be given a location to pick up your reward by simply giving your assigned code. No questions are ever asked. Reporting crime to Crime Solvers is safe, convenient and easy.

Check To Make Sure You Are Prepared!

Being Prepared means being equipped with the proper supplies you many need in the event of an emergency or disaster.

The beginning is always the best place to start. It's January (the beginning of the year) so it's a good time to check on your emergency preparedness. Do you have a plan in place? Do you have an emergency kit ready? If you have a kit is everything still in date? If your kit was prepared for the spring and summer you might want to add a few items to help get you through the colder weather.

At a minimum, you should have the basic supplies listed below:

- ⇒ Water: one gallon per person, per day (3-day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home).
- ⇒ Non-perishable food, easy to prepare items
 (3 day supply for evacuation, 2-week supply for home).
- \Rightarrow Flashlight and extra

batteries. \Rightarrow Batterypowered or

hand-crank radio.

 \Rightarrow First aid

kit.

- ⇒ Medications (7-day supply) and medical items.
- \Rightarrow Multi-purpose tool.
- ⇒ Sanitation and personal hygiene items
 (bucket, toilet paper, bleach).
- \Rightarrow Matches.
- \Rightarrow Can opener.
- \Rightarrow Extra cash.
- ⇒ Cell phone with charger.
- ⇒ Family and emergency contact information.
- \Rightarrow Blanket.
- \Rightarrow Maps of the area.

Each family is different and you may need to add supplies to your kit such as:

- For babies, formula, diapers, baby food, bottles.
- Small children, games and activities.
- Pets, collar, leash, ID, food, bowl.

- Medical supplies (hearing aids, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, etc.).
- Extra set of car keys and house keys.

Other items that may be useful:

- ◊ Whistle.
- ◊ Rain gear.
- ♦ Towels.
- ♦ Work gloves.
- ◊ Tools.
- Plastic sheeting.
- ♦ Duct tape.

We live in times when you can buy supplies that will last a long while. It doesn't hurt to keep some on hand. You might be glad you did.
