Getting Ready For the Cold Weather

Do you use your fireplace? If so, get it checked out and make sure it is ready to use. Have your furnace cleaned and checked for any problems. Cover your outside furniture and bring in the hose and tools.

Have your vehicle checked out for winter driving. Check the tires, windshield wipers and window washer fluid. If you need to clean out the gutters on your house, make sure you use a sturdy ladder. Don't do it alone in case of falls. You can also get the job done faster with a little help. If the children are playing in the piles of leaves, check to see that they aren't too close to the road or driveway. They can be well hidden to a driver that might just pull through the pile.

While you are on a ladder and near the roof you just might want to put up your holiday decorations. It will be here before you know it.

Change the batteries in your smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors. Make sure to check the alarms with the new batteries installed.

Never use your oven or stove to heat your house. Never leave a burning fire unattended. Make sure a fire in a fireplace is completely out before going to bed. Always use a fireplace screen to keep sparks from flying out of the fireplace. Allow at least three feet of empty space around electric heaters. The days get shorter in the fall making it more difficult to see children walking and riding bicycles. Please drive with caution.

PREVENTING CHARITY FRAUD



Food Pantry Donations Needed

It's that time again. Charities are out to collect as much as they can before the end of the year. People are giving so they may claim it on their taxes. Everyone is in the holiday mood and ready to give to those in need. How do you know your money is going where you intended it to go?

- Ask how your money will be used. What percentage will go to the actual programs versus the administrative and fundraising costs?
- Request written information that gives the full name, address, and phone numbers of the organization as well as a description of the program it supports.
- Check out any charity you don't know with the local charity registration office, the Better Business Bureau or a charity watchdog group such as www.charitywatch.org, www.give.org, and www.guidetar.org.

- Don't give in to high pressure or emotional appeals that urge you to donate on the spot. If you are unsure, don't be afraid to ask for more information.
- Don't be fooled by a name that closely resembles the name of a respected and wellknown charity. Make sure you know who you are dealing with.
- Give directly to the charity if possible, rather than to an organization claiming it will forward your donation to the charity.
- Keep careful records of all your donations so you can identify fraudulent scams that claim you made a pledge you don't remember making.
- Ask for the charity's tax-exempt letter indicating its IRS status. You can't claim a taxdeductible donation if the charity does not have one.
- Never give cash. Make your contribution in the form of a check payable to the full name of the charity.
- Give out your credit card number only if you are certain that you are dealing with a

legitimate charity, then make sure that the numbers will be encrypted.

 Don't give out your Social Security number. A charity does not need it in order for you to claim a tax deduction.

Some charities have been around for years:

St. Jude's Hospital or

Shriner's Hospital, for example. If you donate to these well known charities make sure they are not look–alike websites or mailings. People are getting so creative. Some mailings look so legitimate.

Charitable giving has never been easier. With a few clicks of a computer mouse, you can connect with causes you care about, learn how your support will make a difference, and put your money where your heart is by making an instant online donation or pledge on a charity's website. Be careful; fraudulent fundraisers know that giving is an emotional act, and they're good at pulling heartstrings.....and pocket strings too.
