So even though it may look festive from the street, it's a good idea to keep your Christmas tree away from the front window. If your tree is visible from the street, perhaps don't put the presents out until later.

Be careful how much information you give away on social media. Poolside holiday pics from afar and checking in on Facebook at overseas locations can

be an advertisement to thieves that your home is a sitting duck to be burgled. The same goes for pictures of any expensive Christmas presents.

If your idea of Christmas is to go all out with enough decorative lights to cover your home that you're visible from any flight path, make sure you don't leave any extension cords hanging out of open windows, it provides an easy way for burglars to get it. Remember, Christmas may be the season of goodwill, but it is also the time of year where thieves want to get their hands on presents for their own friends and families so make sure they don't get them from your car while you are shopping.

Getting a new super sized flat screen TV is exciting, but it's best to keep this information to yourself. Make sure you don't publicize what you got for Christmas by placing packaging and boxes out on the street. Break down the packaging as much as you can and put it in dark trash bags. That way you won't be advertising what everyone in your house received for Christmas.

Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year! Please be careful while out shopping for Christmas gifts. Try not to go out alone especially at night. Don't leave your purchases in full view in your vehicle. Cover up

or place them in your trunk. Enjoy yourself at office, neighborhood and family parties.
Don't drink and drive. If you see a vehicle that is driving erratically or swerving call 911 and report them. Be very careful when fol-

lowing them but get the tag number if it is safe to do so, and give as much information as possible when describing the vehicle and where you are. Have someone else in the vehicle call or use your hands free option.

Holiday Driving Tips



First a few no brainers:

- * Do not speed.
- * Do not text.
- Do not drink and drive.
- ⇒ Make sure your vehicle is operating properly. The lights, oil, tires, belts and hoses. The brake fluid, antifreeze and the condition of the battery should all be checked by a professional.
- ⇒ Plan your route in advance and check traffic reports and weather conditions before you leave. As a backup bring a paper map.
- ⇒ Follow speed limits and remember excess traffic and congestion on the roads may mean you'll have to travel below posted limits and may arrive later than expected.
- ⇒ Drive defensively and don't respond to aggressive drivers.
- ⇒ A good night's sleep could make the trip more enjoyable. Make sure to take regular

- breaks during long road trips.
- ⇒ Be prepared for emergencies. Keep a blanket, boots and an extra pair of gloves and a flashlight in your vehicle. Keep the gas tank at least half-filled.
- Relax, driving during the holiday season can be stressful. Frustration can lead to poor decisions and risky behavior behind the wheel.

If you are hosting or attending a holiday party. Most parties involve alcohol. While you want to enjoy yourself or want your guest to have a good time, keep your eye out for anyone who may be drinking too much, and either provide a place to stay or a means to get home with a designated driver. Here are a few steps you can take to prevent holiday drinking and driving.

- Have a designated driver. It's one of the simplest rules to follow, but also one of the most effective in keeping people safe on the roads.
- Have cab or Uber numbers on hand. If someone should not be driving and they insist on going home,

- call a cab for them instead of allowing them to take the risk of driving home.
- Offer plenty of nonalcoholic drinks. While many guests may want to enjoy the holidays with an alcoholic drink, offer nonalcoholic drinks as an option.
- Offer food if you're offering alcohol.
 Drinking on an empty stomach can cause a person to become intoxicated faster. Offering food along with drinks may help prevent guests from overindulging on alcohol alone.





If possible, drivers should try to stay off the road between the hours of midnight and 3 a.m., when drunk driving accidents are most likely, according to research from the U.S. Department of Transportation. And if the weather is bad, which can easily happen in the northern and central states, consider revising your plans so you won't have to travel on icy or snowy roads. With a little foresight and by taking precautions, you can enjoy your holiday season and stay safe as well.
