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Know the Difference

- Winter storm warning:: Snow, sleet or ice expected..
 - Winter Storm Watch: Snow, sleet, or ice possible. This is usually issued 12-36 hours in advance of a potential severe storm.
 - Winter Weather Advisory: Winter weather conditions are expected to cause significant inconveniences and

may be hazardous.

- Freezing Rain: Rain that freezes when it hits the ground or other surfaces, creating a coating of ice on roads, walkways, trees, and power lines.
- Sleet: Rain that turns to ice pellets before reaching he ground. Sleet also causes moisture on roads to freeze and become slippery.
- Wind Chill: the temperature it "feels like" when

you are outside due to the combined effects of wind and cold temperature.

Blizzard Warning: Sustained winds or frequent gusts to 35 miles per hour or greater and considerable amounts of falling or blowing snow are expected to prevail for a period of 3 hours or more.

Holiday Shopping Safety

- If at all possible, shop during the day. If you have to shop during the evening hours, don't do it alone. Park in a well lit area and be aware of your surroundings.
 - If things don't look right when going to your vehicle, turn around and go back

into the store. Ask if security or an employee can walk you to your vehicle .

 Don't carry cash. Use a credit card but only carry the one you know you will be using . If there is a questionable charge the credit card company will help you dispute it.

- Put your purchases in your trunk or where they cannot be seen.
- Don't walk to your vehicle with your hands full. Have your keys ready.

Enjoy your shopping but don't let your guard down.

Call takers are trained, certified professionals who can help you during an emergency, but there are also a few simple points to follow to help the call taker help you.

Tips for calling 911

- Tell the call taker your location, any landmarks or cross streets of where the emergency is and a brief description of what happened.
- Listen to the call taker's questions and answer clearly. 911call takers are trained to ask the questions necessary to determine the type of medical, police, or fire response you need for your emergency.
- Be prepared to receive immediate lifesaving instructions over the phone until help arrives. Do not hang up until you are told to.
- If you dial 911 by mistake, don't hang up.
 Let the call taker know you contacted them by mistake. Call takers

many send first responders unnecessarily to check on the disconnected call.

Teaching Children to call 911

- Never use the term "nine-eleven"— there is no 11 key on the telephone.
- Explain reasons you would call 911 and what the meaning of an emergency is....
- Make sure your children know their address, phone number, full name and the full names of their parents.
- Teach your children to look at their surroundings when they're not at home. Street signs, street numbers and numbers on building and homes.
- Make sure your children can use a landline and a cell phone.
- Make sure your children know to get out first, before calling, if there is a fire or burglary.
- Tell your children to stay on the phone af-

ter they dial 911 and to follow the instructions of the call taker. Tell then they're to stay on the phone until they are told to hang up.

 Instruct children to call 911 only when there is an actual emergency. A life or death situation.
