While you are out shopping, here are a few safe-

ty tips:

- Shop during the daylight.
- Stay alert and be aware of what is going on around you.
- Don't overburden yourself with packages. Have your keys ready in your hand.
- Lock your vehicle. Put all packages and shopping bags in the trunk. If you don't have a trunk cover items with a blanket.
- Carry your purse close to your body. Don't let it dangle on your arm.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash. Use a check or credit card whenever possible.





Caution: Deer Crossing

They might be beautiful near a babbling brook. They might be cute on movies such as Bambie, but deer can total your vehicle or cause you to end up in the woods or crashed into another vehicle.

Stay alert, pay attention. Deer will run out not only from wooded areas but also in neighborhoods. When you see one, there are usually more close by. Deer travel in herds. Use high beams when you can so you might see their eyes ahead. Brake as necessary. If you can avoid hitting the animal, reduce your speed, honk your horn and tap your brakes to warn other

drivers. Don't swerve. This can put you in the path of oncoming vehicles or trees. Don't veer off the road, you may end up in a ditch and over correct. If an animal-car crash is inevitable, maintain control of your vehicle.

Remember it is mating and hunting season.

Don't rely on a whistle. No scientific evidence supports that car-mounted deer whistles work. Obey all traffic laws and wear seatbelts.

If you strike a deer, pull to the side of the road if you are able. If the deer isn't dead, don't approach it. Dial 911 and let them know

if you are alright and if the animal needs to be put down. If you are injured let them know you need medical attention.

Deer aren't the only furry friends crossing the road. You know the tag-team squirrels on the GEICO commercial. I think they live in my neighborhood. Night time driving I see opossum, raccoons and skunks wanting to share the road. Just be careful and know they are out there. I think a deer could do the most damage though.

 Using the information on the car's registration in the glove compartment, they drove the car to the people's home and robbed it.


 They used the remote garage door opener to get into the house.
