- · Place a hold on your mail to ensure your mailbox is empty while away.

If your loved one qualifies to become a client within the program, they will be issued a transmitter. The issued transmitter is about the size of a common wrist watch and emits a frequency that allows a Search Specialist to track the client when they are reported missing.
